SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

September is National Preparedness Month, a crucial reminder of the importance of being ready for the unexpected. Disasters can strike at any time, often without warning, and being prepared can make all the difference in ensuring your safety and the safety of your loved ones.

One of the first steps in preparedness is creating a basic emergency kit. This kit should include essentials like water, non-perishable food, a flashlight, batteries, a first-aid kit, and any necessary medications. These items can help you navigate the initial hours and days after a disaster, especially if basic services are disrupted.



BUILD A KIT

A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items:

- Water (one gallon per person per day for several days for drinking and sanitation)
- Food (at least a several-day supply of non-perishable food)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert
- Flashlight
- First aid kit

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- Extra batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)

- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Plastic sheeting, scissors and duct tape (to shelter in place)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (for personal sanitation)
- Wrench or pliers (to turn off utilities)
- Manual can opener (for food)
- Local maps
- Cell phone with chargers and a backup battery

CREATING AN EMERGENCY PLAN

Equally important is developing a plan with your family and friends. Communication can be challenging in an emergency, and having a predetermined meeting point and plan of action is crucial. Make sure everyone in your family knows the plan, including what to do if they are away from home when a disaster strikes.

Children should be familiar with the plan. Teach them how to recognize safe places to go if they are not with family, and ensure they know how to contact you or another trusted adult. Knowing what to do can empower them to stay calm and make smart decisions in a crisis. Talk to their schools and understand what their plans are in the event that an emergency occurs during school hours.

SMOKE ALARM SAFETY

- Install smoke alarms on the ceiling or wall in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen and at least 10 feet from the stove.
- Difficulty hearing? Smoke alarms are available with strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Use interconnected smoke alarms when possible. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms monthly by pressing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms 10 years after the manufacturer's date found on the back of the smoke alarm.
